Catholic Campaign for Human Development 2011 Local Grant Guidelines

Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) is the United States Catholic Bishop's education/action program to combat poverty in the U.S. CCHD funds raised locally are disbursed in two ways: seventy-five percent is sent to the national office to be distributed to organizations that address conditions of poverty in critical areas such as community development, housing, economic justice, health care, education and legal aid. The remaining twenty-five percent is distributed locally. The Diocese of Oakland CCHD Local Committee makes the final decision on qualifications and funding for local grants each year.

To Receive Local CCHD Funds, organizations must show that they enable groups of low-income people to influence the decisions that affect their lives. Specifically, organizations must show how the affected population participates in the decision making process of the organization, through the board, the staff or the activist base. CCHD funds are given to support programs that empower people in or near poverty to change the conditions that affect their lives.

CCHD Funds May Not Be Used For a direct service (soup kitchen, homeless shelter, etc.) to people in poverty. CCHD also cannot make grants to individuals, for capital expenditures or improvements, for existing staff not involved in new activities, or for activities contrary to the teachings of the Catholic Church. Groups do not, however, need to be Catholic to apply.

Other CCHD Criteria for local grants are that

- A) The organization generates cooperation between diverse groups,
- B) The organization's work benefits a relatively large number of people,
- C) The organization has a budget.
- D) The project must benefit a poverty group. At least fifty percent (50%) of those benefiting from the project must be from the low-income community.
- E) Members of the poverty group must have the dominant voice in the project. At least 50% of those who plan, implement and make policy (e.g. the Board of Directors or the Project Board) should be persons who are involuntarily poor (Clergy, VISTA volunteers, students, etc. are considered by CCHD to be voluntarily poor.) For projects that do not presently meet this criterion, applicant must document the following in the proposal narrative:
 - a) Why members of the poverty group do not have the dominant role in planning, implementing and policy making at the time of application.
 - b) How members of the poverty group were involved in determining their need for the project,
 - c) What time schedule is planned for the poverty group to assume leadership and control of this project?

CCHD Local Grant Guidelines Favor Two Types of Applicants.

The first is the applicant who aspires to receive national funding but needs further organizational

development. The local grant request can ask for funding to build capacity, such as:

- Leadership development
- Technical assistance to pay for consultants on organizational development
- Fundraising training for staff and leaders to increase and enhance a diversity of income
- Increasing civic participation
- Other areas important to developing organizational strength and self-sufficiency

The second type is community or parish-based efforts that address poverty by an empowerment model of organizing. In this model, low-income people have a significant share of the decision making of the group.

All programs must be based in Alameda or Contra Costa County and must be a non-profit organization or under the fiscal sponsorship of a non-profit organization. Organizations that have been approved for funding from National CCHD or other local CCHD funds in the present funding cycle are not eligible to apply for a local CCHD grant at this time.

PROHIBITIONS: As an initiative of the Catholic Church in the United States, CCHD cannot fund organizations that engage in activities that contradict fundamental Catholic moral or social teaching (e.g., promotion or support of contraception, abortion, same-sex marriage, euthanasia, racism, the use of the death penalty, or punitive measures toward immigrants, etc.) Prohibited activities include participation in or endorsing actions that promote legislation, ballot initiatives (including voter guides and other written materials) that contradict fundamental Catholic moral or social teaching.

CCHD cannot fund groups that knowingly participate in coalitions that have as part of their organizational purpose or coalition agenda or actions that contradict fundamental Catholic moral or social teaching.

Grants are made in the range of \$2,000-\$5,000. Larger grants are occasionally made in special circumstances.
